Cooperative Learning



Why?

- * In cooperative learning, students work with their classmates to achieve group goals and help one another learn.
- * Cooperative learning provides a means through which students can develop complex cognitive skills.
- * Cooperative learning facilitates effective information processing of instructional material.
- * In a cooperative learning environment, students provide social support for academic achievement (Slavin).
- * Cooperative learning facilitates long-term memory and retrieval.
- * Friendships across racial and ethnic groups are likely to form.
- * Students demonstrate greater interest in school subject matter, participate more actively, more often encourage and support one another's learning, and are less likely to misbehave in class.

How?

- * Form small, heterogeneous groups.
- * Provide clear goals toward which groups should work.
- * Give each group member a different role or task with the group.
- * Monitor group interaction.
- * Provide critical information and insights when a group is unlikely or unable to provide such information and insights for itself.
- * Make students individually accountable for their achievement.
- * Reinforce group success.
- * Ask students to evaluate their effectiveness in working as a group.
- * Vary the duration of cooperative groups depending on the task to be accomplished.
